3rd - 4th November 2016

Day 1

Last November, partners of the Frailomic Initiative gathered to discuss progress and share insights into the project so far. The meeting was held at the Barceló Illetas Albatros hotel where the partners were able to enjoy the facilities, some even enjoyed a well deserved swim despite the season! The objectives of the meeting were to update partners on the project, publications and financial reporting.

SERMAS opened the meeting with a warm welcome from Leo and a project update from Frailomic project manager, Dr Betty Davies Urizar. The Exploratory phase results were presented, including the number of participants from which samples had been received in each of the four cohorts: TSHA, AMI, INCHIANTI and 3C.


3rd - 4th November 2016

Betty updated the consortium on the progress of the Validation phase, in which there are six participating cohorts (TSHA, ENRICA, SardiNIA, MAPT, SAGE and EXERNET). To date, samples from three cohorts (TSHA, ENRICA and SardiNIA) have been shipped and samples from EXERNET, MAPT and SAGE were to follow. A list of biomarkers selected for investigation during the Validation phase was presented and the decision of which particular biomarkers was to be made at the meeting.

David Gomez Cabrero Lopez, from

YouHealth presented information on the datasets and reminded partners of the statistical approach being used to generate the minimal models. Stefan Walter then discussed the concept of Inverse Probability Weighting.

Stefan explained that as the proportion of frail to no-frail cases is different in each cohort, this should be considered when working with multiple populations and in secondary outcome analysis. In an interactive session of 'PubliDating' partners pitched their publication concepts and were matched with fellow partners, with similar interests, to form the beginnings of a fruitful publication for the Validation phase! On this productive note, Day 1 ended and attendants enjoyed dinner and drinks.





3rd - 4th November 2016

Day 2

Niche Science & Technology (NST) presented the dissemination plan and a refresher to the publications process, including the IPC and publication tracking activities that NST coordinate. Laila presented the six manuscripts that had obtained IPC approval during 2016 and seventh that was undergoing IPC approval. With these manuscripts approved for development we expect to have many publications from the Frailomic consortium over the next 12 months.

Partner feedback regarding the future direction of these activities had been invited in an on-line questionnaire, sent out prior to the meeting. From the results of the questionnaire it was clear that some participants had been publishing and attending conferences but had not necessarily shared this news with the consortium. The survey also highlighted the need for improved partner engagement within the consortium to improve the impact of the dissemination activities. Drawing a Dissemination Plan

Most memorable was the demonstration of the impact of being team players and using Share of Voice, exemplified by participants throwing scrunched papers at Tim, which was met with surprising enthusiasm! Results from the previous days 'Publi-dating' session were then presented by Stefan. Eight proposals were suggested and we look forward to receiving submissions to the IPC from the collaborating authors!

Fran thanked everyone for submitting their Form C via the participant portal by 15 Jan 2017. The meeting was concluded with a word from Professor Leocadio Rodriguez-Mañas. It was great to meet everyone again and keep the momentum going.

An Update to the Frailomic Data Sharing Policy

In Mallorca, it was agreed that the Frailomic database will be available to all consortium members. Now, just one step is required whereby partners forward their request and institutional IP address to YouHealth. Imad sent a notification, on 22 January 2017, of the release of Version 03 of the Frailomic Exploratory phase database. Updates to the database were made at the request of partners for an integrated dataset that can be used for analysis and clinical data was updated to fix some bugs.

The YouHealth team issued a new dataset in early February 2017. This dataset excludes the Mosaiques and Metabolite data and is smaller in file size to the integrated data. Please continue to feedback to the YouHealth team and direct your feedback/queries to the relevant contacts listed below:

The suit that ages you 40 years in 5 minutes

Partners at the Getafe hospital are helping volunteers understand the passage of time and experience the physical aspects of ageing with a GERontologic Test (GERT) suit that simulates age-related impairments.



With earmuffs that reduce hearing and a collar and vest weighing 2–4 kgs, the GERT suit restricts movement and puts pressure on the spine affecting gait. As a result, everyday tasks such as walking and climbing a flight of stairs or any movement in general will cause instability and require greater effort. The suits also have gloves that use small electric shocks to replicate hand trembling and difficulty catching and holding objects.

The GERT suit has caught the attention of El Pais newspaper and has made numerous TV and radio appearances recently, including the national station Cadena de Ondas Populares Españolas ('People's Radiowaves of Spain Network'). Their exciting product range includes a research use only kit based on circulating miRNAs to predict the risk of osteoporotic fractures. The products were showcased at the American Society for Bone and Mineral Research (ASBMR) 2016 Annual Meeting and TAmiRNA also led a workshop on circulating miRNAs in Vienna.



TAmiRNA have also released a new microRNA qPCR kit that rapidly measures circulating plasma miRNAs to analyse platelet function from samples as little as 200 µL. This offers a minimally invasive option to those involved in platelet function research, anti-platelet therapy and age-related/cardiovascular diseases.
